


THE RHINE TODAY

Navigable Rhine: 884 km


330,000,000 t/year = 2/3 goods transported by river in Europe

(the most important and most modern inland navigation waterway in Europe)


Fleet capacity: 10,000,000 t







- At the heart of European transport flows
- Connected with other modes of transport
- Inland navigation in Europe = 6% market share of the various modes of transport

THE OLDEST INTERNATIONAL ORGANISATION STILL IN OPERATION

Created in 1815 by the Final Act of the Congress of Vienna

Headquarters: Strasbourg/Palais du Rhin since 1919/1920


Today 5 member States: Germany, Belgium, France, the Netherlands, Switzerland

MAJOR PRINCIPLES OF THE RHINE REGIME

- Freedom of navigation, involving the dismantling of physical, fiscal and legal obstacles
- Equal treatment
- A prosperous navigation sector based on coordination of member States' waterways
- Single legal regime

2015: creation of a European committee (CESNI) for developing common standards for the entire EU and CCNR




2013: signing of the second administrative arrangement signalling the desire for enhanced cooperation

MISSIONS

- adopting technical standards in various fields [...] to which the respective regulations at the European and international level, including the European Union and the CCNR, will refer with a view to their application,
- deliberating on the uniform interpretation and application of the said standards
 [...]
- deliberating on derogations and equivalences of technical requirements for a specific craft;
- **deliberating on priority topics** regarding safety of navigation, protection of the environment, and other areas of inland navigation.
